

# The University of Wolverhampton approach to progression and awards for those students impacted by COVID-19 pandemic

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## Summary of position and approach

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The University of Wolverhampton has responded to the COVID-19 pandemic by temporarily adjusting some of its academic regulations in order to ensure that student attainment is supported and, where appropriate, protected. Specifically, the approach taken has been to mitigate the potential impact that Semester 2 or 3 assessment might have on expected progression, award, and final degree classifications.

The detail of the approaches taken and changes made are explored in the subsequent sections of this document, however in broad terms the approach has been:

- To support students in making assessment submissions through extended deadlines and deferral opportunities
- To support students in being able to progress to their next level or achieve their award through alternative means of non-summative assessment (where it is appropriate and possible to do so)
- To support students by adjusting the calculation to degree classifications such that module results from semester 2 and 3 can be discounted (where required) and thus not be detrimental to their final classification.

The changes introduced reflect the University of Wolverhampton's commitment and approach to minimise the impact and disruption that the pandemic will have on its students. The approaches adopted are proportionate, robust, and mitigate impact whilst remaining as closely aligned to its existing academic regulations as possible.

It is important to note that the changes are only to be implemented where it is possible to do so, and as such will not include all students on all courses. Specifically, courses with PSRB requirements might not have the amendments applied.

## Progression and award credit requirements

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4.5 and 5.1 of the academic regulations articulates the university's approach to credit requirements for progression and award (respectively). Principally there are no changes to the requirements for credit with respect to either progression or award. That is to say, there are currently no adjustments of the number of credits required to progress between levels or receive an award i.e. first degree honours students will still require 360 credits to obtain their award. The change instead focuses on the methods by which attainment of credit is assessed.

### Approach to qualifying marks and grading schemes

Each module has an associated grading scheme that details the requirements with regards to minimum pass marks (qualifying marks) – these differ depending on whether the module is undergraduate or postgraduate in level. The qualifying marks associated with each module (and as articulated in 4.2.2 and 4.2.4 of the academic regulations) will remain in place with no downward adjustment to be made.

### Exceptional Passes: non-summative award of credit

The intention, through moving teaching and assessment (where ever possible) to be wholly online, is that the vast majority of students will gain credit through the typical means i.e. summative assessment. However in recognition that some students or programmes, will be negatively impacted by being unable to access on-campus facilities (such as general IT equipment, specialist software or equipment) the university stated *'For some programmes (for example, those involving performance or practice-based assessments) decisions on progression may necessarily need to be based on alternative criteria.'* In practice, this statement requires an adjustment to regulation 4.1.1 (marked in red) as follows:

To gain academic credit, a student must demonstrate that they have achieved specified learning outcomes. Academic credit will only be awarded to students as follows;

- a. through granted accreditation for recognition of prior learning through the defined University process, or;
- b. successful completion of module summative assessments that meet the specified learning outcomes.
- c. through module leaders (conferred by the award board) determining (where summative assessment has not been possible) that the student has met the learning outcomes of the module through either attendance/engagement, completed assessment components, or formative assessment.

This change will apply to 2019/20 semester 2 or 3 modules only.

Detailed guidance and criteria will be provided to module leaders and award boards to ensure consistent application of this amendment. Where a student is awarded credit based on c. then a mark will be awarded (reflecting their competency) and an exceptional pass (EP) will be recorded as the grade.

## Award classification adjustments

The approach to final award classification calculations aligns to the wider approach to mitigate the impact of semester 2 or 3 modules on student progression and attainment, and thus the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on their outlook.

In doing so, the University of Wolverhampton have adjusted the classification calculations across all applicable awards, such that (where needed) the module results from semester 2 or 3 are not counted where performance in them differs adversely comparative to performance in other countable modules.

### Borderline profiling method

The University of Wolverhampton operates borderline zone regulation for honours degrees, whereby an award can be made at a higher classification if the overall average falls into a specific range and further criterion is met. Each individual award has different criterion, and therefore any adjustments to it are detailed in each separate award table in this document.

For completeness, it should be noted that the percentage average range for borderline consideration has not been adjusted. These are articulated in 5.2.1 and are:

### Adjustments to award classification algorithm

The percentage grade average will be based on the grades from the student's best credits taken at the University of Wolverhampton on their current course as detailed in the tables below. Marginal fails at 35-39%, where a pass by compensation has been awarded, will be counted towards the percentage average if they fall within the best results as defined below.

## Coverage of award classification adjustments

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### Students for whom these adjustments apply

This addendum to the 2019/20 academic regulations will apply to all students studying at level 5, 6 or 7 who were current and active in the 2019/20 academic year. The addendum will therefore also apply to degree awards made at future dates where the awardees meet the criteria of being current and active for level 5, 6 or 7 in 2019/20. For example, current level 5 students in 2019/20 will have their award calculated as per this addendum in 2020/21. Students on industrial placement (sandwich year) in 2019/20 will not have the addendum applied to their final award calculation.

### Students on leave of absence and repeating students

Students who take a leave of absence or repeat a year of study, but were current and active on level 5, 6 or 7 in 2019/20, will have their award calculated as specified by this addendum.

### Part-time students

Completing part-time students who were active on semester 2 or 3 modules that otherwise would count towards the calculation of their classification in 2019/20, will have the adjustments outlined in this paper applied. Part-time students not completing their award this year, will not have the adjustments applied in the future.
